The proposed code 1609 Development Studies includes the following sub-fields:

- Poverty, Inclusivity and Well-being
- Rural Development
- Socio-economic Development
- Sustainable Development
- Urban Development (excludes planning)
- Development Studies not elsewhere classified

A huge congratulations to the working group led by Anthony Ware who put together the DSAA proposal. A major aim of the DSAA was an FOR code for Development Studies, and it is wonderful to be almost there within our first year!

The work is not finished yet, as submissions on the proposed changes are being received until February 10, 2020. The DSAA has drafted a letter in support of these changes (thanks again, Anthony), and we are encouraging members to write similar submissions from their respective universities.
